For me, the second best part of teaching is learning from others. Might be the wisdom or whimsy of ancient or current

commentators on our sacred texts, different ways to appreciate our traditions and practices, questions and comments from our venerable sages, Shirat Hayam adults or Galeem children — there's always something to learn!

The best part of teaching is sharing those ideas and insights with eager learners and discussing the whys and wherefores of what we do Jewishly and how we find meaning in our Jewish lives. I treasure learning with adults, whether one-on-one or in a group; I value learning with students in our Sunday school classrooms, and I cherish the individual interaction with our young people as they prepare for the service marking their coming of Jewish age as a bar/ bat mitzvah.

These kids are in the process of changing their status in terms of Jewish responsibility and privilege. They're thinking about a lot of things, not all specifically Jewish, as they shape their views of themselves and the worlds in which they live. In the context of my learning with them, most of their questions or comments focus on something Jewish:

- The Israelites made a lot of mistakes in the wilderness, and made God angry. How did they make up for their mistakes?
- Was it okay for Joseph's brothers to lie to him by telling Joseph that their father had said something that he hadn't said?
- Are there sports that are considered "not kosher"?

• Why do people write notes and stick them in the cracks between the stones of the Kotel (Western Wall) in Jerusalem? And what happens to those notes?

• I have some thoughts about God....

Rich discussion sometimes results; other times we have to learn a bit more to begin to formulate a response. If you have attended a service at which a bat/bar mitzvah spoke, I hope that you learned from that student.

We are taught to not view learning Torah (or other Jewish texts/ideas) with an eye toward some kind of reward in this life or in the World to Come — which itself is worthy of a class or two! Rather, learning should be *"lishma," for its own sake, i.e., for enrichment and enlightenment.*

Come learn with me and other teachers in our community;


you'll also be enriched by sharing with the other learners. Like a smorgasbord, a variety of opportunities is before you; pick one or two to taste, then come back to the table as often as you wish.

What a great way to spend a little time during the chilly days of winter ... or any season of the year!

Cantor Jacki's Message



It is not your duty to finish the work, but neither are you at liberty to neglect it. (Pirkei Avot 2:15-16)

When a young Jewish adult becomes bar mitzvah at 13 or bat mitzvah at 12, we affirm that they are now obligated to engage in mitzvot and make their own decisions about their Jewish lives. Although they may not be able to drive a car or rent an apartment, it is understood that, at least by means of their faith and tradition, they have a voice and make a difference in their community.

I first became aware of the work of the Religious's Action Center when I served as a Vice President for the American Conference of Cantors. Part of my portfolio was social justice and I have since served in various capacities on the Commission on Social Action. Not long before the Covid-19 pandemic began, I helped to coordinate cantorial colleagues from around the US attending the Consultation on Conscience. I even had the honor of welcoming then Congressman, and now AJC CEO, Ted Deutch before former Speaker Nancy Pelosi's keynote address.

For many years I had hoped to bring Jewish teens to experience a similar youth oriented L'taken Social Justice Seminar sponsored by the RAC that was well known for its powerful lasting impact on the Jewish teens who are fortunate enough to attend.

What is L'taken?

L'Taken is a transformational 4day weekend focused on Jewish values, tikkun olam and public policy. The program exposes high school students to a variety of public policy issues, guides them to explore the Jewish values surrounding these issues, and delegation to the L'taken Social Justice Seminar at the Religious Action Center in Washington, DC includes post B'nai Mitzvah students Asher Bell, Julia Koch, and Zachary Tafeen along with Scarlett Wolk. Cantor Wolbransky's Message



TU B'SHEVAT

The 15th of Shevat is the New Year for Trees, known as Tu B'Shevat. It will be observed on

February 13, 2025.

According to Biblical law, there is a seven-year agricultural cycle, concluding with the Sabbatical year, a year of rest. When the Holy Temple stood in Jerusalem, on years one, two, four and five of this cycle, farmers had to separate a tenth of their produce and eat it in Jerusalem. This tithe defined as a tenth part of agriculture or other produce, personal income, or profits, contributed either voluntarily or as a tax called Maser Sheni, the Second Tithe, because it is in addition to the two percent which must be given to the Kohan, and the ten percent which is given to the Levite. On the third and sixth years of the cycle, instead of the owners eating the Maser Sheni in Jerusalem, they gave this second tithe to the poor, who were allowed to consume it wherever they wished.

It takes approximately four months for the rains of the new year to saturate the soil and trees and produce fruit. On the Sabbatical year, no tithes are separated. All produce which grows during this year is ownerless and free for anyone to take. It was therefore of vital importance to ascertain when the new year started for produce. Our Rabbis established that a fruit which blossomed before the 15th of Shevat is produce of the previous year. If it blossomed afterwards, it is the product of the "new year." By comparison, grains, vegetables, and legumes have the same New Year as humans, the 1st of Tishrei in the Mediterranean region. The rainy season begins with the festival of Sukkot. It takes approximately four months from Sukkot, the 15th of Tishrei, until the 15th of Shevat for the rains of the new year to saturate the soil and trees and produce fruit. All fruit which blossomed beforehand are a product of the rains of the previous year and are tithe together with the crops of the previous year.

On this day it is customary to partake of the fruit with which the Holy Land is praised (Deuteronomy 8:8): olives, dates, grapes, figs, and pomegranates. If tasting any of these fruits for the first time this season, remember to recite the Shehchayanu blessing. This blessing is recited on joyous occasions, thanking G-d for sustaining us and enabling us to reach this occasion. This blessing is recited before the standard blessing recited on fruit. Due to the festive nature of the day, we omit the

Tachanun sections during prayers. Tachanun prayers petitions for forgiveness and confession.



In Judaism, visiting the sick (*bikur cholim*) is an important act of loving-kindness (*gemilut hasadim*) that requires one to provide physical or emotional support to someone who isn't feeling well. Home visits can be healing, and a visit from one male to another may be a welcome distraction.

Activities such as playing cards, watching sports, or talking about current events can be most appreciated. These visits are intended to make a person feel encouraged and cared about, and may put a smile on someone's face.

Some guidelines: please call first to see if, and when, visits are welcome. Keep in mind that mornings and evenings may be difficult for the person you are visiting. If you see the congregant tiring, it is time to leave. Of course, if you are ill, save your visit for another day.


