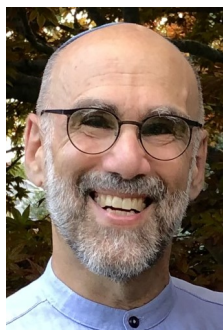

DAY BY DAY

Ellie's exercise regimen against Parkinson's includes reading aloud, "with intent." It helps with breathing,

posture, and projection. It also helps get her husband to say "What?!" less often.

We looked for a text to read daily without delving into the generally depressing newspaper. We found Rabbi Joseph Telushkin's *The Book of Jewish Values*, which had also been recommended by our friend Roy Friedman.

The Book of Jewish Values is subtitled "A Day-by-Day Guide to Ethical Living." It contains six daily entries for 52 weeks; the seventh day, Shabbat, is reserved for a recommended family or other interpersonal discussion of the previous six essays. The teachings range from half a page to a little over two pages.

Examples of subjects covered:

- *How to treat your loved ones;*
- *How to act with people you don't like;*
- *Ask forgiveness from another person;*
- *Teach your children to survive in an often cruel world;*
- *Don't be too self-deprecating;*
- *Express gratitude — now — to those nearest you;*
- *When legal doesn't equal moral;*
- *Don't spend unnecessarily on a funeral, and*
- *Put into action the teachings in this book!*

A little over a year ago, Ellie began reading one entry each day. (A few times, we took a week off for various reasons and just resumed the next Monday; you can start the book on any Monday.) The reading has made mornings more meaningful than just coffee, breakfast, and yesterday's news.

Entry number 362 (a Thursday) is an instruction — study Torah and review it regularly — and an invitation: "Use this book a second year, for with the passage of time, many of the lessons might be forgotten." We will consider rereading this one in a year or two; for now, Ellie and I are checking out other work that feature daily Jewish teachings.

I highly recommend Rabbi Joseph Telushkin's *The Book of Jewish Values*. (I don't usually pay attention to the gushing blurbs on book covers, but the accolades by well-known personages ring true.) Aside from the potential of personal growth this volume encourages, it is uplifting to consider some of the worldly yet common sense wisdom it offers.

Read it aloud to a friend, read it aloud to yourself. (It has helped Ellie with her breathing and both of us with its inspiration.) Our sages of old, and those of our time, have much to teach. We benefit by being eager students.

Cantor Shoshi Levin Goldberg

As we move into the fall, we are honored to share the **High Holy Days together on September 11–13 and September 20–21**.

We can't wait to welcome you and share these meaningful moments as a community.



As we move through the dramatic arc of the Hebrew months of Tammuz, Av, and Elul, Judaism calls upon us to lean mindfully and purposefully into reflection rather than turn away from devastation. This sacred rhythm prepares us, spiritually and emotionally, for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur — the Head of the Year

and the Day of Atonement.

The flow of this season reminds us to confront challenge and loss honestly, even as we implore God on Yom Kippur not to turn away from our pleas, but to hear our voices. We begin by remembering the historical tragedies associated with the 17th of Tammuz and Tisha B'Av before turning inward toward the work of *cheshbon hanefesh* — soul-accounting — as the month of Av gives way to Elul.

For many Jews, the High Holy Days remain meaningful even without extensive preparation. Yet when I hear the words *Al ta'azveinu* — “Do not abandon us” — in the Selichot liturgy, I am reminded that these prayers call us to a deeper awareness of covenantal responsibility: our responsibility to God, and God's responsibility to us.

The ancient rhythm of our lunar calendar continues to speak powerfully to the contemporary Jewish experience. In a world that feels increasingly fractured and polarized, these sacred cycles invite us not only to mourn devastation, but also to emerge with clarity, resilience, and a renewed commitment to flourishing Jewish life.

I was reminded of this recently at the Re-CHARGING Reform Judaism Conference at Stephen Wise Free Synagogue in New York City. Several themes from the gathering continue to resonate deeply as we move towards Elul.

One powerful takeaway came from Rabbi Ammiel Hirsch, who described this moment as “an inflection point in Jewish history,” urging the Jewish community to set aside daily controversies and work together for the greater good. He spoke about the importance of strengthening Jewish peoplehood while resisting both the “false philosophy of expanding Jewish universalism” and the “narrowing of Jewish particularism. Liberal, pluralistic, big-tent Jewish identity, he argued, must still contain a clear and recognizable Zionism. We cannot afford to marginalize ourselves from the broader Jewish community.”

A second important perspective came through conversations connected with the organization Jewish on Campus. The young dynamic speaker highlighted the growing generational divide around language, activism, and identity. Understanding the language of contemporary activism — and finding a common language through

which to communicate — has become essential, even within our own families. Refusing to engage with one another only deepens fractures.

At times, even opening a conversation can feel impossible. Representatives shared that, for some antizionist circles, engaging respectfully with someone who holds a different view can itself be seen as betrayal or “enabling.” In such an environment, facts alone often fail to persuade. Data about Israel's successes and contributions may not penetrate when nuance itself is rejected. In those moments, the conversation must begin not only with information, but with moral clarity and human connection.

A third takeaway came from Dara Horn, celebrated author of “People Love Dead Jews” and the work of The Tell Institute (<https://www.thetellinstitute.org>). Horn challenged listeners to think deeply about the Jewish story itself. “Israel is a nation of storytellers,” she reminded us. Yet she also spoke bluntly about the persistence of antisemitism throughout history.

During this season of introspection, perhaps we are called to dig more deeply into the story of our people. Why have Jews remained distinct for thousands of years? How do we define Jewish Identity today — as religion, peoplehood, culture, civilization, or something broader still? How do we welcome those who are seeking, adjacent to Jewish life, or still discovering where they belong?

The Jewish story has carried a consistent moral message across generations: human beings do not need to bow to tyrants, and we do not surrender our humanity or moral courage in the face of fear.

As Elul approaches, each of us might ask: Where can I make a deeper commitment to Jewish peoplehood? Can I strengthen my connection to Jewish literacy, community, memory, or practice in the weeks ahead? I am interested in hearing your thoughts about Jewish identity and peoplehood. May each of us find our own place within a flourishing Jewish landscape.

May we lead with clarity and moral courage.

And may we continue telling the Jewish story from generation to generation.

If we work at it, together we will keep Shirat Hayam in the vanguard in Atlantic County. 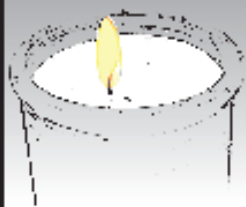

Shirat Hayam Honored Those Who Serve & Protect

On June 10, 2026, Shirat Hayam hosted a first-of-its-kind program honoring Atlantic County first responders and military personnel. The event expressed heartfelt appreciation for the daily service and unwavering commitment of police, fire, EMS, and military members who serve and protect the community.

The program was coordinated by Sgt. Brian Shapiro of the ACPD, a Shirat Hayam Vice President and Board of Trustees member who worked

discussion panel moderated by Matthew Hartman, a retired Captain of the Pleasantville Police Department. As a respected law enforcement leader with more than two decades of service, he has a strong commitment to officer wellness and resilience. The panelists covered a wide range of topics.

- Larissa Brewster, LCSW, discussed how cumulative exposure to trauma can affect responders throughout their careers and what warning signs they should recognize. She specializes in emotional wellness and provides valuable support to first responders and law enforcement personnel.
- Dr. Dave Lorenzo, DPT spoke



tirelessly to organize the event. Resource professionals were also available to share information about services including counseling, nutrition, therapy, orthopedics, chiropractic care, and legal services.

Several workshop sessions offered valuable information. The keynote speaker was William “Bill” Mazur of Sentinel Resilience Solutions, a retired Deputy Chief of Police from the ACPD. A retired police commander, Bill now works with those who support first responders and focuses on current approaches to treatment and support. He is a nationally recognized expert in resilience and first responder wellness, working with agencies, clinicians, and leadership teams nationwide to strengthen long-term wellness for first responders and their families.

The program also included a

can find a realistic path to improving their physical health. David brought a unique perspective on resilience, performance and wellness, drawing from extensive experience in law enforcement, tactical operations, fitness and peer support.

- Dr. Barry Rizzo, DC, discussed the support available to first responders through integrated healthcare and wellness initiatives. He emphasized education and operational readiness as essential to public safety.
- Patrick Dellane, retired from the Toms River Police Department, shared his expertise as a former K-9 officer, emergency services unit member, Training Sergeant, Lieutenant of

about the situations that can affect the body such as sitting long hours in a patrol vehicle or at a desk. Suggestions were given of practical steps officers can take during their shifts to reduce pain, improve mobility and to stay physically prepared for the demands of the job.

- Dr. Glen Zuck provided a perspective as an orthopedic surgeon. His emphasis was on how prehab and rehab work together to help responders prevent injury and recover effectively.

Shirat Hayam used this program to extend their sincere gratitude to all first responders and military personnel as well as their community partners who supported and collaborated to make this event possible and meaningful.

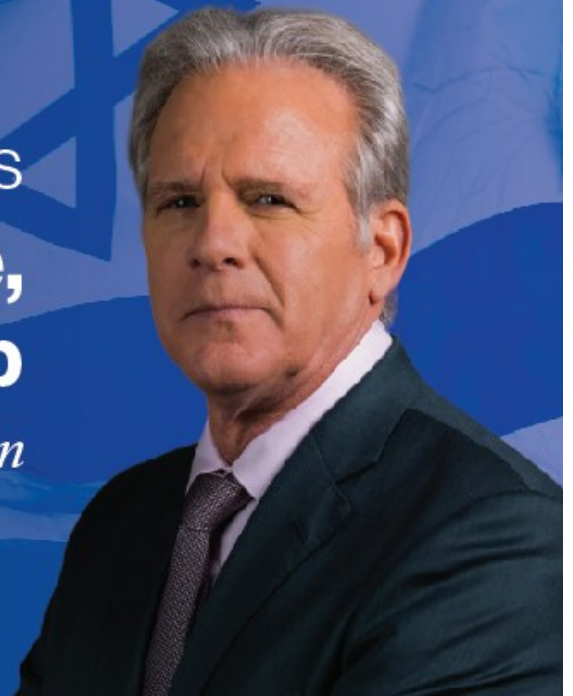
